# WORDS FROM OUR CEO

When I first started New Life Stories back in 2014, I never imagined the tremendous impact that our agency would have on our families. New Life Stories was my passion project, but has now grown to be a powerhouse in the fight against intergenerational incarceration. From 91 families and 364 service users in 2021, we now support 121 families and 425 service users! With many collaborations and projects in the works, we only expect the numbers to grow in the next few years.

Since fine tuning our Family Strengthening Programme last year, we continued to build on our systemic practice approach and extended our support throughout multiple layers of each family system. By supporting each child's educational and pro-social development, building the resilience and communication skills of their parents through inprison workshops, and supporting caregivers and other family members, we've increased the depth of our social impact to ensure the lives we change stay changed. Since having this operating model in place, we have seen significant progress in the lives of our families. We are always listening and learning from our families to see what works best for them to thrive in our community.

We are very excited to share that we are the recipient for the Ministry of Home Affairs's recipient for the Ministry of Home Affairs's National Day (Home Team Partner) Award for Excellence for our Family Strengthening Programme, a testament to the impact we have made in our families. We are also the recipient for the Yellow Ribbon Advocate of Second Chances (Community Partner) Award for the advocacy work we do in raising awareness of the need to support families impacted by incarceration.



We could not do the work we do without our dedicated volunteers who visit our children every week during their befriending sessions. For the first time since the pandemic, we held our first face to face Volunteer Appreciation Day held in December where our volunteers came together to get to know other Learning Friends, sharing their experiences and reflecting upon what volunteering with the children means to them. Our Learning Friends are the eyes and ears of our agency. We are deeply grateful to our passionate volunteers who have selflessly put in the love, time and effort into making a positive impact on our children's lives.

At New Life Stories, we believe that we cannot exist alone. We work closely with partners to ensure that the families we serve continue receiving the support they need to rebuild their lives and rewrite their stories.

Our immense gratitude goes out to many of our partners, including Singapore Prison Services, National Council of Social Services, Tote Board, UOB, ST Logistics, Kewalramani Foundation, Amazon, NVPC, Endowus and the Netherlands Charity Association continuing to believe in our agency and support our cause. We are very excited to welcome new partners like Murex, Odyssey The Global Preschool, Lancia Consult, Break the Cycle SG and My First Skool. We are grateful for their support and excited to continue working with them for the coming years! We would also like to thank our donors - individual women, men and children who have been supporting us to give back and serve our families. Each of their names are etched in our grateful hearts for their contributions to uplift our families. This past year, for the first time since the pandemic, we were finally able to bring our children out for learning journeys!

In September, we worked with the National Gallery team to tour the Children's Biennale Exhibition where the children got to explore many interactive stations during their visit. We also partnered with Wealth Allianz for Children's Day where our families got the opportunity to visit the Qian Hu Fish Farm - the kids especially loved longkang fishing! These out-of-school learning experiences have made a profound impact on the children, fostering personal growth and a love of learning that will last a lifetime.

I'd like to thank everyone who has enabled us to carry out our mission to be a beacon of hope for these families and to provide the love and support they need to overcome the challenges of incarceration. We hope to continue forging greater partnerships and collaborations with like-minded agencies, to further strengthen our families and continue empowering them in their journey to recovery. With many exciting opportunities and plans for our future, we can find ourselves one step closer to reducing the recidivism rate not just for our families, but for our society. Most importantly, with your support, together we are preventing intergenerational incarceration and supporting these families to improve the quality of their lives.

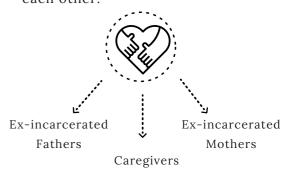

In 2022, we welcomed new faces into our New Life Stories team to strengthen our programmes and reach out to more families. As our team continues to grow, we are looking to launch more programmes and events for our all our service users to provide them with additional support to ensure that they have a holistic experience with our team.

## **OUR WORK**

Our Family Strengthening Programme is the core programme here at New Life Stories. Encompassing three essential pillars, we are able to have multiple touch points with every member in the household of the incarcerated, to ensure that they are all wholly supported to strengthen the entire family unit.

Our befriending programme, incare prison workshops and family care & advocacy are the three main pillars that make up the Family Strengthening Programme. Through these programmes, we apply a systemic practice throughcare approach to support the families on their journey to empowerment.

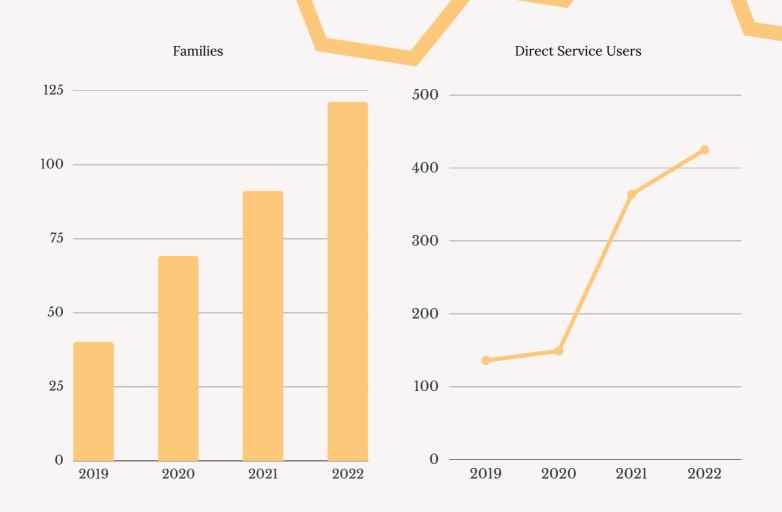

# NLS IN NUMBERS

Here is an overview of how much we have grown over the years.

Through the years, we have increased the number of families that we serve by 33% and correspondingly by 17% for our direct service users. From 136 direct service users in 2019 to 425 in 2022, we have extended our reach to every family member living in the same household to work and support the whole family. Working with the family system and every individual is essential in our strategy to strengthen our families to improve their relationships and encourage healthier conversations.

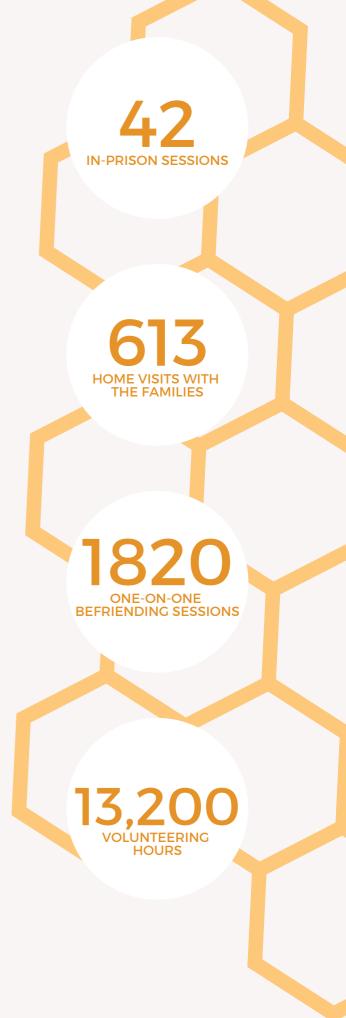


### IN 2022,

Our team works with all family members, volunteers and stakeholders round the clock to ensure that they receive the best care and support to ensure that their journey with us proves bountiful.

Every year we put more hours into servicing and supporting our families through home visits, befriending sessions and incare training. Our Family Stregthening Programme embodies all three elements to ensure that our families experience a holistic supporting system within our agency. The numbers on the right reflect the number of sessions we held in 2022.





### BEFRIENDING PROGRAMME

The befriending programme is one of the core programmes that we provide for all children between 3-12 years. Our children voluntarily participate in this programme, with consent from their caregviers to have volunteers visit their homes every week for at least 6 months to engage with them in reading and activities to build long-lasting relationships and improve their pro-social skills. This is to ensure that these children can have educational and emotional stability for a fairer start in school and are not left behind in their crucial early years of development.

#### LITERACY

84% SHOWED AN INCREASE IN LITERACY We observed that 84% of our children had could read better compared to that in 2021. We measure the improved literacy of our children under the befriending programme to assess the effectiveness of our befrienders in enabling the children to excel not just socially but academically too.

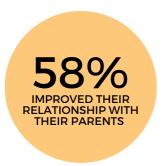


Our children have improved in their selfconfidence by 72%. Building our children's self-confidence and pro-social skills are especially important to ensure that they are adept at coping with the challenges at home and at school. befriending programme allows children to express themselves creatively through art and activities prepared by our volunteers.

## RELATIONSHIP WITH PARENTS



We also assess if the children's relationship with their parents have improved after the sessions. We found that 58% of our children have better relations with their parents. Through these befriending sessions, our parents can also learn how to engage their children and in turn build closer family relations.



# FEEDBACK FROM THE CHILDREN AND THEIR CAREGIVERS

We collect feedback from our children and their caregivers throughout our programme. Below, you can find some learning points and thoughts from them since being part of our programme.

## PARENTING INCARE PROGRAMME

Our first points of contact with the families are through the parents in prison.

Over 20 weeks, parents who sign up for our programme are taught parenting tips and ways to strengthen their communication with their children. Through this programme, they are also encouraged to write a story to their kids and audio record themselves reading it. These will then be given to the children during the open visit at the end of the programme. This expression of love aims to provide their children with a gift direct from parent to child to restore their relationship.

42% of our parents are observed to display an increase in parenting competency. This includes being able to connect and care for their child while still serving their sentence as well as providing their children and families with the much needed reassurance that they will be able to resume caregiving roles upon release.





While many of our parents still struggle to cope with the many challenges surrounding their own incarceration as well as their upcoming release, 46% of them showed an increase in self-confidence. Preparing for their parenting role generates a lot of stressors which might inhibit their progress especially right before their release.

At the end of our programme, we assess if the parents observe an improved relationship with their children. Last year, 35% of our parents shared that they are able to communicate and connect with their children more effectively compared to before their enrollment.

With these recognitions, we hope to continue onward to provide high quality support to all our service users and their families to ensure that reincarceration rates within the ex-incarcerated remains low, and empower them to eventually graduate from our programme.

# CORPORATE PARTNERS

Through their Shoebox Appeal initiative, the school lovingly wrapped and decorated books and toys in repurposed shoeboxes, which were gifted to each of the children at New Life Stories. In addition, NCA wrapped and presented more than 200 extra books for our children, and provided a generous aid of \$5,000 to support our children and their families.

During the festive season of giving, we were privileged to have **Murex Southeast Asia** join us as a valued partner. Through a heartwarming initiative, the Murex team banded together to fulfill the Christmas wish lists of our children, even taking the time to wrap each present with care. We are deeply appreciative of Murex's efforts to cultivate a culture of generosity within their organization and for making our children's dreams come true.





### **FUNDRAISING**

Many of our partners have also supported us through running fundraising campaigns both internally with their own teams and externally with the general public.

Fundraising efforts provide us with not only an avenue to build on our relationships with our partners, but also provides more awareness on the work that we do. We are always very grateful to both exisiting and new partners for their support of our programmes. Through such efforts, we can not only reach new audiences, but also use such funds to improve the quality of our services leading to more effective programmes to better meet the needs of our families.







During the first two weeks of December in 2022, **UOB** invited us to partner with them for the fifth consecutive year of their Gift for Good campaign, a campaign where UOB staff participate in gift-giving for our children during Giving Week. Through the generosity of everyone at UOB, we were able to purchase educational science kits for all 127 children in our care, raise \$20,000 in matching donations and we even received an extra \$9,567.54 in aid of the children and families we serve!

Every year, **Odyssey** selects one charity to be its benefactor from its Colours of Odyssey Art Exhbition. Students from all its campuses created art works using a variety of mediums and materials. There were paintings, sculptures and mixed medium art created by these 3-6 year olds. The artworks are then put up onto a virtual exhibition where their parents can purchase the artwork. \$25,000 collected from the proceeds of the artworks were then donated to New Life Stories to support our children.









5 students from **Hwa Chong Institution** approached us to be a benfeficiary for their project, Project Liberi. The students aim to spread awareness on the emotional turmoil that children with incarcerated parents face and how the community can better support them. They put up a showcase for students from HCI to attend - proceeds from ticket sales go to support New Life Stories cause. Through their efforts, they have managed to raise over \$6,000 to support our Family Strengthening Programme!

## Tlanciaconsult



In 2022, we forged a meaningful partnership with LanciaConsult, who organized their annual 10/10 Run, a fundraising event committed to creating a lasting social impact on communities. With a remarkable show of support from the LanciaConsult team across 13 countries, 124 participants ran an impressive 1,650 kilometers and raised a total of \$6,184 for New Life Stories. We are humbled to be a part of this impactful initiative and look forward to continuing our collaboration in the years to come!

**Endowus** partnered us once again this year for their annual Giving Machines campaign. 20 vending machines filled with donation items were placed all around Singapore to allow the public to make their donations by purchasing cards to provide much needed items for our families. This year, donors can purchase art materials, science kits and drawing tools for our children to support them during their befriending sessions. With over 66 cards sold and through online donations, they managed to raise \$2,420 to support our programme!

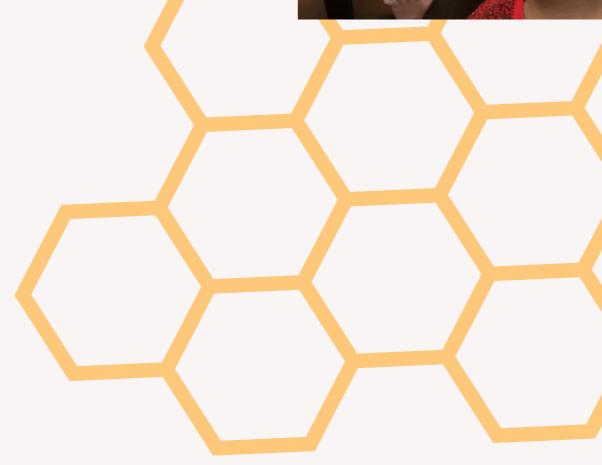


Students from Ngee Ann Polytechnic organised Project Smiles, a programme to promote our fundraising campaigns. Aside from а virtual walkathon, the students also organised an online programme to engage 20 of our children in storytelling and online games to support their learning and development. Through this initiative the students raise \$1,375 to support our programmes!

We were the beneficiary for My First Skool (MFS) Punggol's Art Fiesta held between 13-17 June! Tote bags designed by children from the preschool and our befriending programme were put on sale during the fiesta. Our children were encouraged to explore dot art and were provided with the necessary materials from the preschool. Through this campaign, MFS Punggol managed to raise \$640 to support our charity.

# ENGAGEMENT WITH MOS FAISHAL IBRAHIM

We have had the honor and privilege of having MOS Faishal attend our events as well as engage with our families in 2022. MOS has met many of our families during both our virtual and physical open visits, as well as gave us the opportunity to be involved in grocery and Korban distributions for our families. Below are some of our engagements with MOS in 2022.

#### NLS OPEN VISIT AT CHANGI PRISON

MOS Faishal engaged with our families who attending our Open Visit held in Changi Prison. These open visits are held at the end of our 20-week incare programme and gives our families the opportunity to meet with their loved ones face to face in prison.





#### NLS VIRTUAL OPEN VISIT

Before the official lifting of visitations by SPS, we held virtual open visits for our fathers to interact with their families for 1 hour at our office space. These sessions were extremely precious to our families allowing them to have a private uninterrupted session with their loved ones in prison.

#### **OUR KAMPUNG GELAM GIVES BACK**

NLS was one of the beneficiaries for Our Kampung Gelam's grocery drive which enabled our families to pick food items generousely sponsored by Lazada. 20 of our families came down to collect an assortment of fruits, vegetables and event meat at the drive!





#### MOS MEETS NLS VOLUNTEERS

Serena and Jeanette, two of our long-term volunteers had the opportunity to share their volunteering experience with MOS at our office. During the session, they also got to share what they learnt from befriending with our children, and what it means to give back to their community.

#### RAMADAN MEET THE FAMILIES SESSION

For two years now, MOS Faishal makes it a point to visit 2 of our families every Ramadan to deliver over \$200 worth of grocery items. This year, both families, residing in the Nee Soon GRC, shared their hopes for their families' futures and sought his advice on some of their challenges.





#### KORBAN MEAT DISTRIBUTION

NLS was one of the beneficiaries of MMO Rehabilitation Network 's Korban distribution drive. 10 volunteers from F1 Singapura came down to collect and deliver 2kg of meat to 26 of our families all over Singapore.

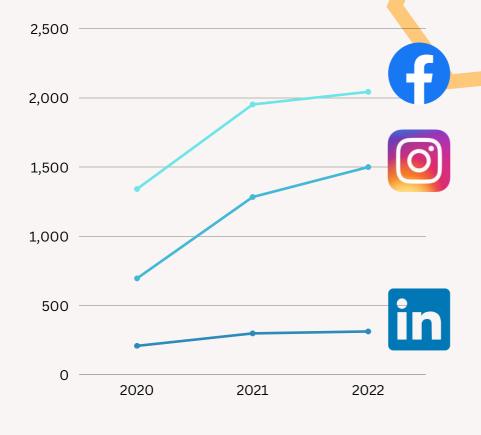
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# SOCIAL MEDIA

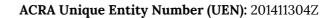
